PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE SOCIAL MEDIA

As a person or a member of a particular organization, it is important to realize that your past, present, and future social media usage can affect you personally.

Most companies don't want to be associated with someone who does not share their principles and policies for fear of ruining their reputation such as old tweets from current or potential employees

that may be considered controversial today. This is why companies are now implementing an online search of their applicants' and employees' social media accounts.

According to a survey conducted to 2,300 employers by CareerBuilder.com, approximately 1/3 said they found content on social media of their applicants that resulted in no job offers, with reasons ranging from provocative or inappropriate photos to poor writing skills, and even disparaging remarks about current or previous employers.

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CONSIDER THESE TIPS TO REFINE YOUR ONLINE FOOTPRINT SO THAT YOU CAN BEST BENEFIT FROM IT.

Do an audit of the different sites and social media you've used or search your name or username in Google to see what has been indexed about you. This can help you delete or hide anything that you don't want to be seen.


<u>Determine which social media websites you intend to continue</u> <u>using</u> and close any other accounts that you won't. It's not an easy process, as some of these websites will continue to keep your record in case you change your mind, but it will still remove unnecessary online presence.

Avoid sharing too much information and limit your content's availability and shareability. Privacy settings can only do so much since it doesn't guarantee that other people or potential employers won't see what you put up, but it's better to be strict than regret being lax.

<u>Watch what you say, post, and tag.</u> As a rule, anything that may be posted in a fit of rage or impulsivity should be regulated. Keep your posts tame if you don't want to be misjudged by recruiters. As much as you have the freedom to post anything you want, it should still be done with self-control.

HISTORICAL PLACES: MT. OLIVET EPISCOPAL CHAPEL, PINEVILLE, LA



Mt. Olivet Chapel on Main Street (pictured left) is the oldest structure in Pineville, Louisiana. It was built in 1857 under the diocesan leadership of Leonidas Polk: First Bishop of the Episcopal Church of Louisiana and General of the Confederacy during the Civil War. Fort Polk in Leesville is named after General Polk who was known as "The Fighting Bishop of the Confederacy". Richard Upjohn of New York, a famous church architect of his time, designed and planned its construction and the Chapel was consecrated on June 29, 1859. All of the pinewood lumber used in construction was harvested from local pine trees.

Hurricane Season 2021

It's Back! The Atlantic Tropical Cyclone Season is here. The 2021 season got a head-start with Tropical Storm Ana. The list of official Tropical Cyclone Names for 2021 had just barely

been released by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration or (NOAA) when Ana formed on May 22. She spent a few days spinning harmlessly in the Atlantic before dissolving into the record books.

WHAT'S THE FORECAST FOR 2021?

The federal government expects another active Atlantic hurricane season this year with as many as ten hurricanes forming this year. An average season sees about seven hurricanes.

Meteorologists from Colorado State University, among the nation's top hurricane forecasters calculate, that if predictions prove accurate, this would be the sixth consecutive season with above-average activity.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO TO PREPARE

The National Weather Service says the time to prepare for a hurricane is now, when you have the time and are not under pressure from an approaching storm. Here are a few tips on getting in gear for the season:

1) Find out if you live in a hurricane evacuation zone. If you do, plan where you would go and how you would get there.

- 2) You're going to need supplies, not just to get through the storm but for the potentially lengthy aftermath. Have enough nonperishable food, water and medicine to last each person in your family a minimum of three days. Electricity and water could be out for at least that long. You'll need extra cash, a battery-powered radio and flashlights. You may need a portable crank or solar-powered USB charger for your cellphones.
- Call your insurance company or agent and ask for an insurance checkup to make sure you have enough homeowners insurance to repair or even replace your home. Don't forget coverage for your car or boat. Remember, standard homeowners insurance doesn't cover flooding.
- 4) If you plan to ride out the storm in your home, make sure it is in good repair and up to local hurricane building code specifications. Many retrofits are not as costly or time-consuming as you may think. Have the proper plywood, steel or aluminum panels to board up the windows and doors.

WHAT HAPPENED LAST YEAR?

There were a record 30 named storms last year, 14 of them hurricanes and seven categorized as major hurricanes (with sustained winds of at least 111 mph).

There were so many storms that the Greek alphabet had to be used to name all of the storms for only the second time on record.

It was the fifth-costliest season on record; damage was estimated at more than \$50 billion, according to NOAA. Laura was the USA's deadliest hurricane of the season. The storm killed at least 40 people after roaring into Louisiana on Aug. 27 with winds of 150 mph. It was the most destructive, causing at least \$14 billion in damage in the USA.

UNITED STATES SUMMER FORECAST – STORMY WEATHER

According to the extended forecast in the 2021 *Farmers' Almanac*, summer should be stormy, with a greater-than-average frequency of thunderstorms for a large portion of the country. Many of these storms will be strong, particularly over the eastern third of the nation. These summer rainstorms may be severe and spawn widespread tornadoes over the middle part of the country during June and July. Portions of the Central and Southern Rockies and Great Plains could also experience higher-than-normal thunderstorm activity.

Summer Heat?

What's summer without heat? It's coming! Summer temperatures are predicted above-normal for about two-thirds of the country, especially in the South and East. While typically the hottest weather can be expected in late July or early August, this year's summer heat could peak in late August, into early September. So be sure to plan ahead and get your air conditioners, box fans, and cool summer clothing ready!
